

Newport couple thank the 999 call handler who supported them through birthing their baby over the phone

When Charlotte Wright, 25, woke up at home in the early hours, she didn't realise just how close she was to giving birth to her second child. Charlotte, now a proud motherof-two, woke up at around 3:20am feeling some discomfort, but quickly realised that she was actually in labour, with contractions just a few minutes apart. Less than half an hour after Charlotte had first woken up, her partner Adam called the Welsh Ambulance Service and was connected with 999 call landler Tommy Saracco-Jones, who is based in Llanfairfechan in North Wales. Charlotte said: "It was such a relief to have someone like Tommy on the phone, relaying instructions to me and Adam via my sister, Chloe, who was holding the phone and passing on everything Tommy was saying." 'Is going home in one piece too much to ask?' – Paramedic steps down after assault

Julie Owen, a Welsh Ambulance Service Paramedic in Colwyn Bay, said the attack by a patient's daughter has left her 'hyper aware' of threats. While Julie has undergone counselling, she says she is no longer interested in the job she once loved. The 56-year-old said: "I've suffered violence and aggression of many kinds over my 20-year career, and I guess this is the last one I'm prepared to deal with. "They build up and up, and one day just become too much. "I feared for my life that night, and the impact on me was something I didn't expect. "Is going home in one piece too much to ask?" With effect from 01 April 2024, the Trust's new name will be the Welsh Ambulance Services University NHS Trust. Fiona, who has worked for the Trust for 17 years, said: "After experiencing wing walking and absolutely loving it, sky diving was the next thing on my bucket list. "When I saw Alzheimer's Society promoting the skydiving challenge to support Dementia Action Week I didn't hesitate to sign up, especially having close family members who are living with this heart breaking and cruel disease." State-of-the-art new fleet workshop in Merthyr Tydfil unveiled

Notably, the site boasts eight electric WAST vehicle charging facilities, including two dual 75kW Pod Point superchargers, making it WAST's first site to accommodate these high-speed chargers. These superfast chargers, along with other investments such as solar panelling aligns with the Trust's vision of reducing its carbon footprint and moving towards carbon neutrality. The Merthyr Workshop brings together fleet teams from Blackwood, Blackweir and Caerphilly into a cutting-edge vehicle maintenance and commissioning facility. Over the last two years, with support from Welsh Government, a comprehensive programme of refurbishment and equipment installation has been undertaken.
